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# Qualitative and Quantitative Hydraulic Analysis of Harmonic Pumping Tests for Identifying the Conduits Networks in a Karstic Aquifer

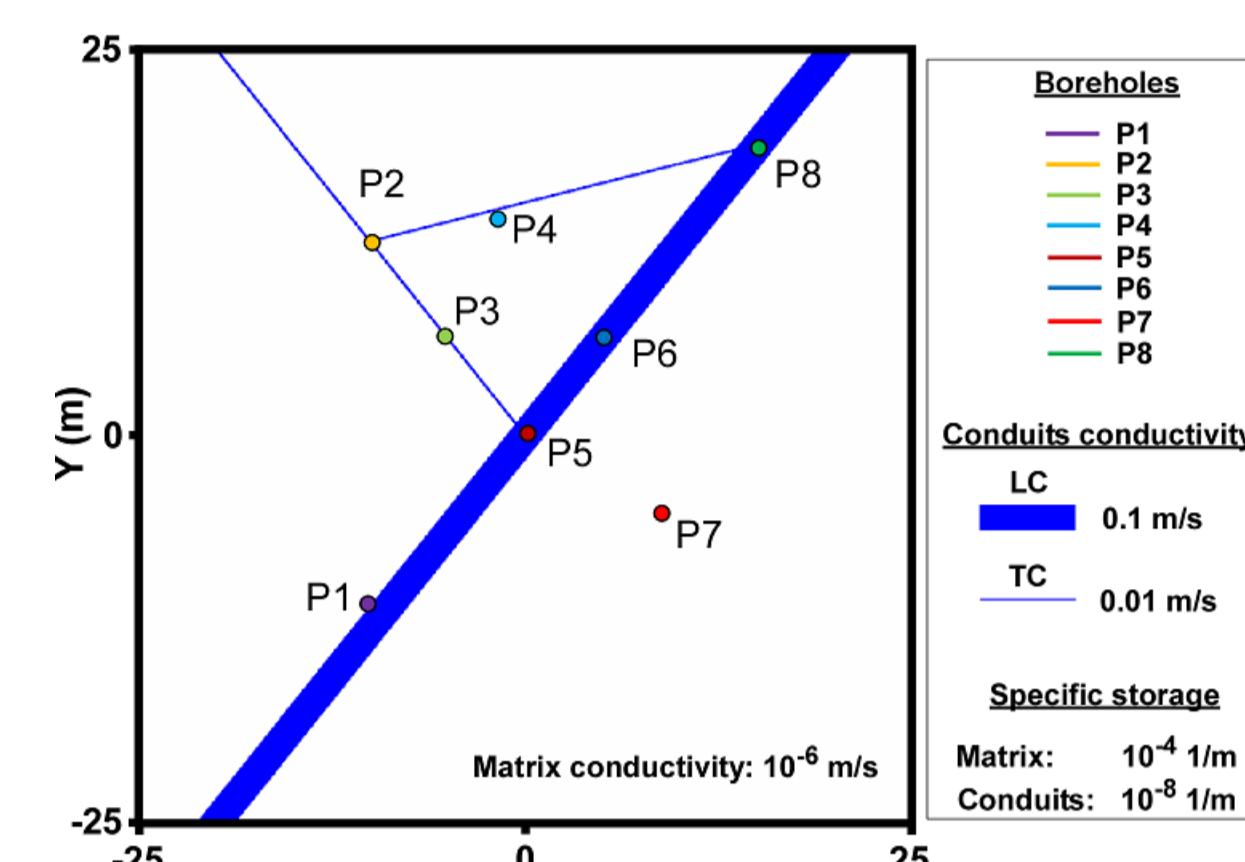
We present a qualitative and quantitative study to understand and interpret the information carried by the responses to harmonic pumping tests performed with different frequencies in a karstic aquifer. This study is first led theoretically on a synthetic case, then on an application case on a karstic field at a decametric scale.

## SYNTHETIC CASE (Qualitative study)

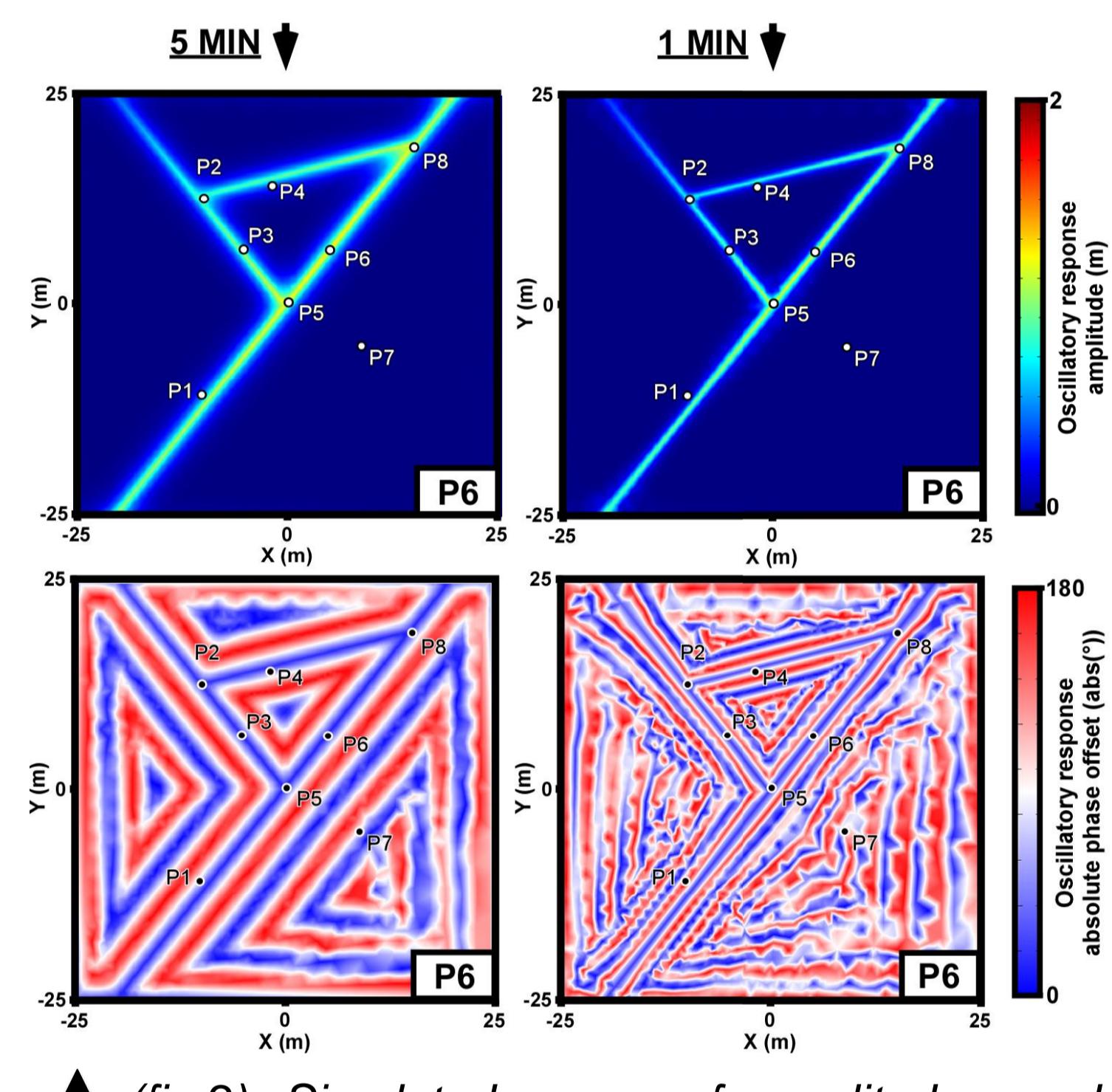
### Synthetic model

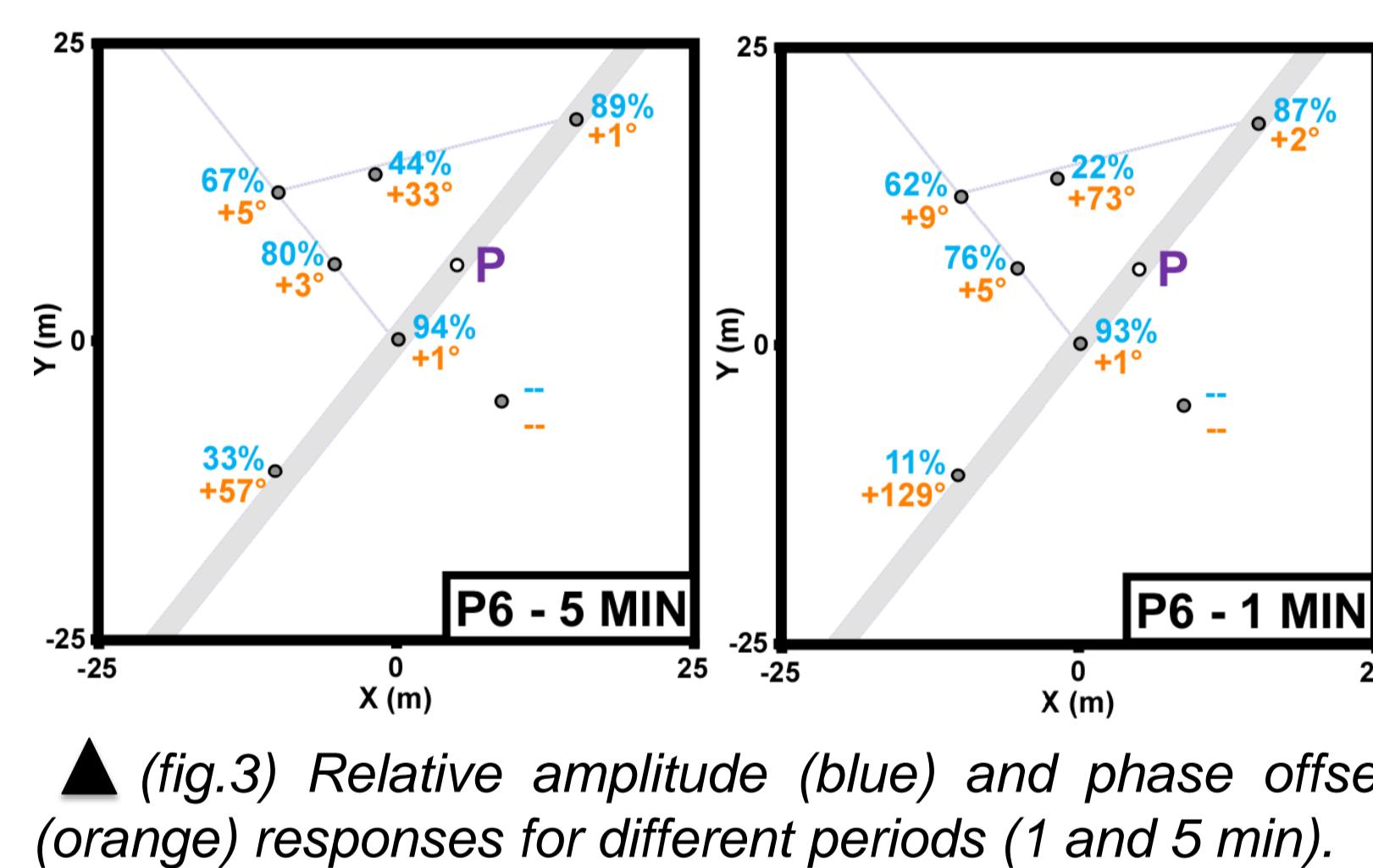
▲ (fig.1) Presentation of the synthetic model.

We have studied the theoretical responses generated by harmonic pumping tests in a 2D synthetic model in a frequency domain (fig. 1). This model represents a simple discrete karstic network in a matrix continuum investigated through 8 boreholes spatially distributed. The model simulates the amplitude and phase offset responses to harmonic pumping tests led for different periods of oscillatory signals.

▲ (fig.2) Simulated maps of amplitudes and phase offsets for different periods (1 and 5 min).

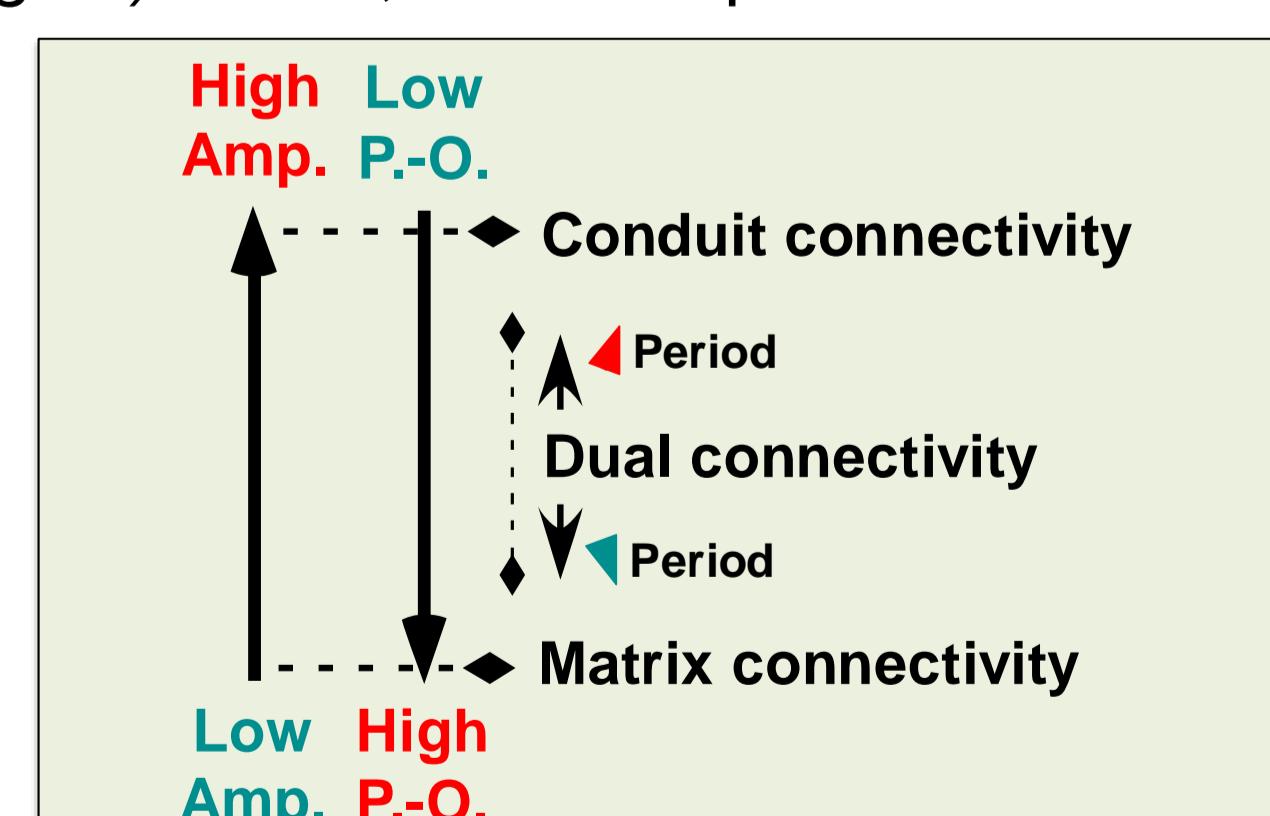
The behavior of the 'dual' responses varies with the period of signal (P1 and P4 in (fig. 3)). Thus, different periods of signal permit to extract different information from the responses, especially for points located at the interface conduit/matrix.

### Impact of the period of signal on the responses

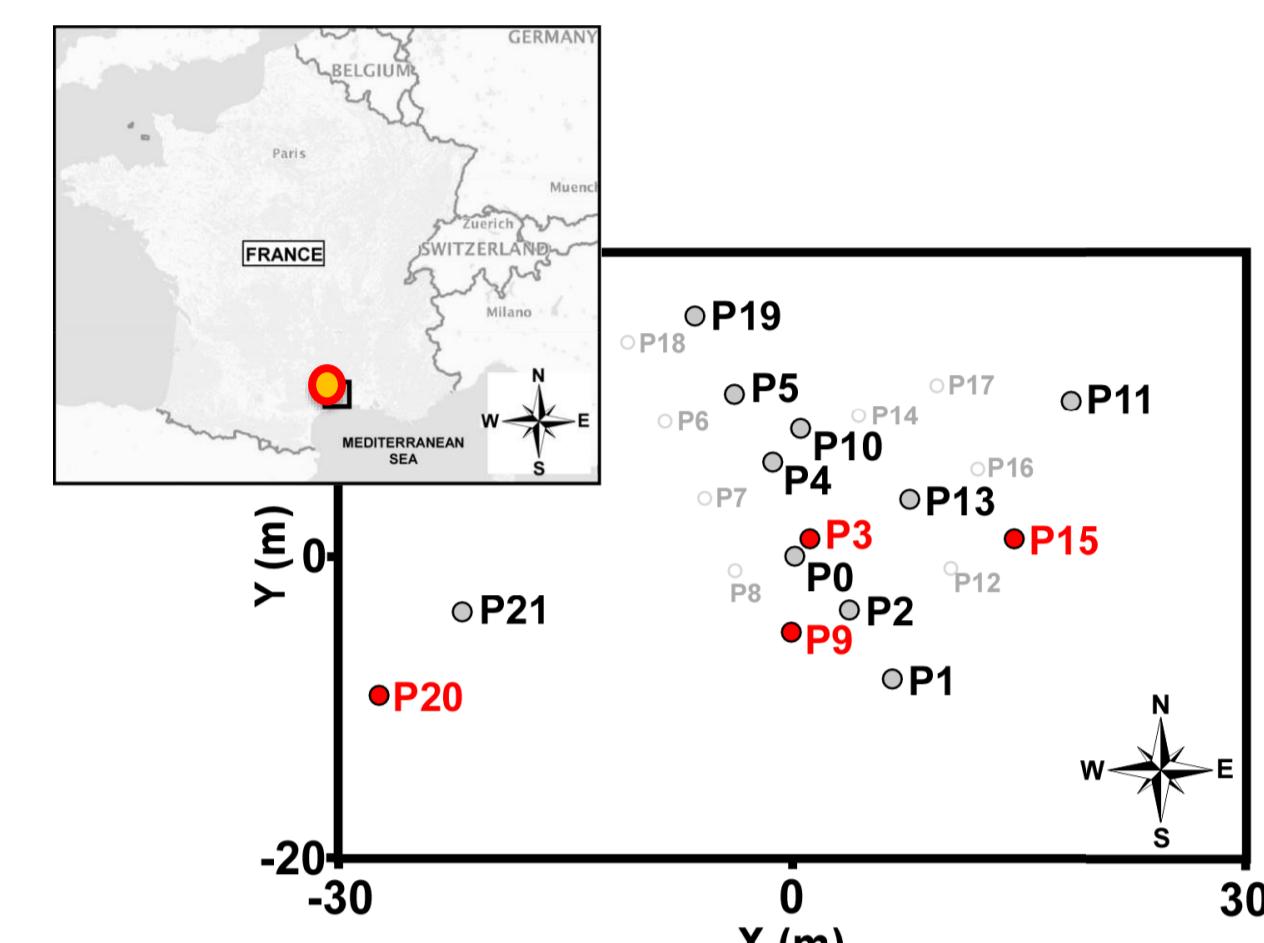
► (fig.4) Schema showing the effect of the period on the amplitude and phase offset responses and the interpreted connectivity.

An increase of the period of signal tends to bring the 'dual' responses closer to 'conduit' responses (increases the amplitude, decreases the phase offset), while a decrease of the period generates the opposite effect and bring the 'dual' responses closer to 'matrix' responses (fig. 4). Thus, a lower period will better characterize the direct conduit connectivity while a higher period will permit to investigate farther in the less conductive media around the main conduit network.

## APPLICATION CASE (Quantitative study)

### Study site and pumping investigation

We have led a harmonic pumping investigation in the 'Terrieu' karstic study site in France (fig.5). The pumping was performed on 4 different wells, each time with 2 different periods of signal (2 and 5 min), while measuring the amplitude and phase offset responses in 13 boreholes.

### Modeling

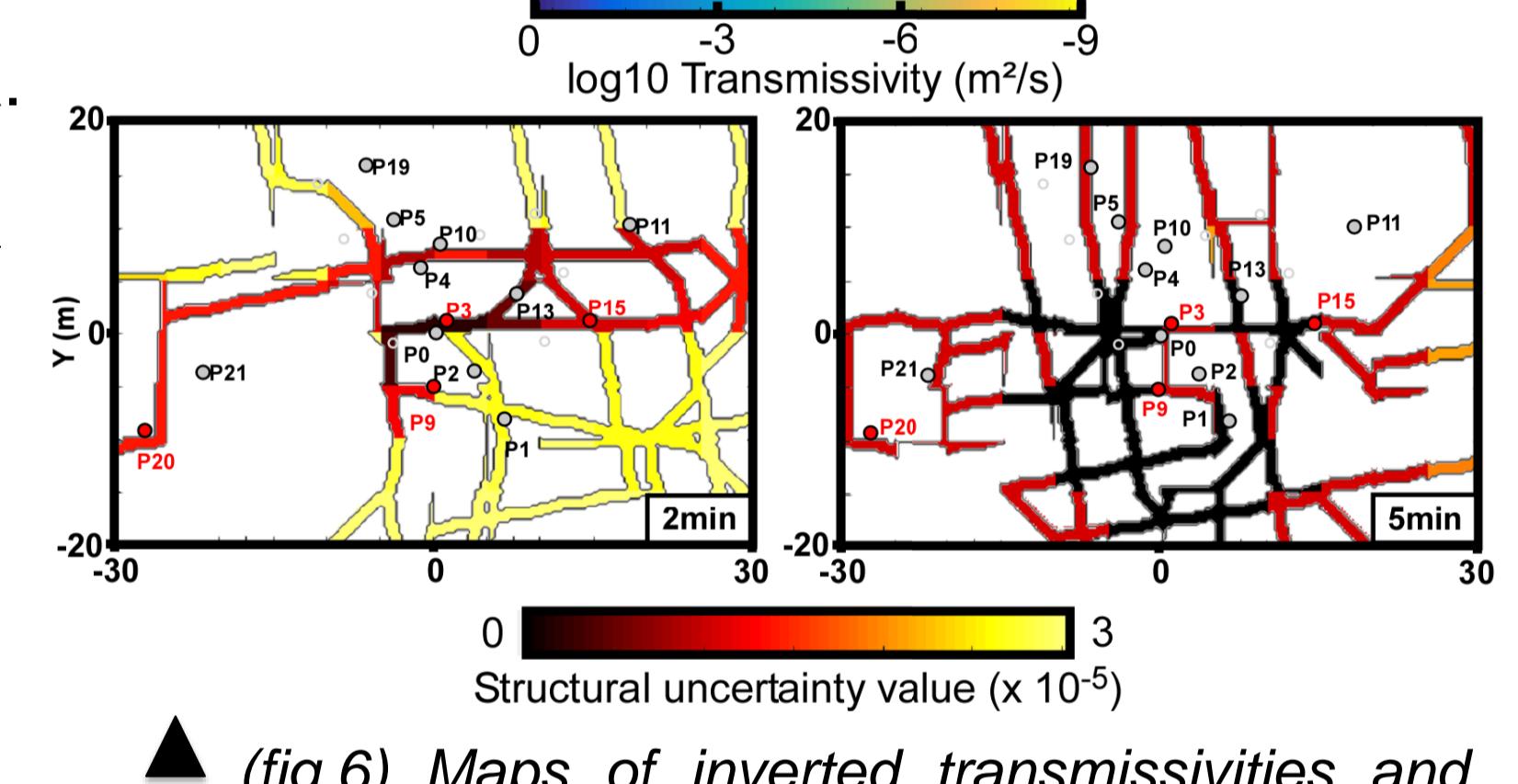
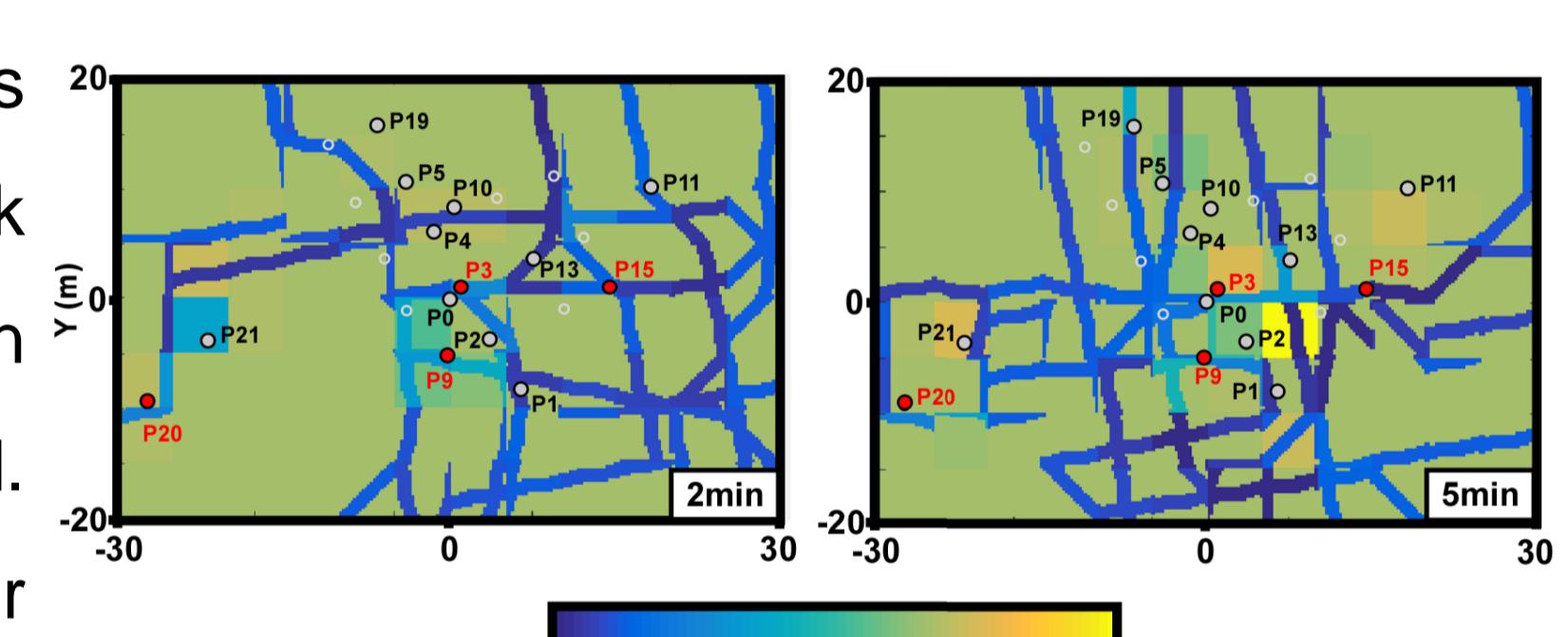
We created a 2D model to simulate, in a frequency domain, the oscillatory responses on the property field of the model, applying the CADI method [3], to reproduce with the model the amplitude and phase offset responses measured during the investigation. Different inversions were led with the responses to the 2 different periods separately, and then jointly using the separate results as new initial models.

### Results

The inverted transmissivity fields (fig. 6) present a denser network with the responses to the 5 min period than with the 2 min period. This denser network is also better constrained with these '5 min' data.

▲ (fig.6) Maps of inverted transmissivities and posterior uncertainties on the network structure for oscillatory signals of period 2 min and 5 min.

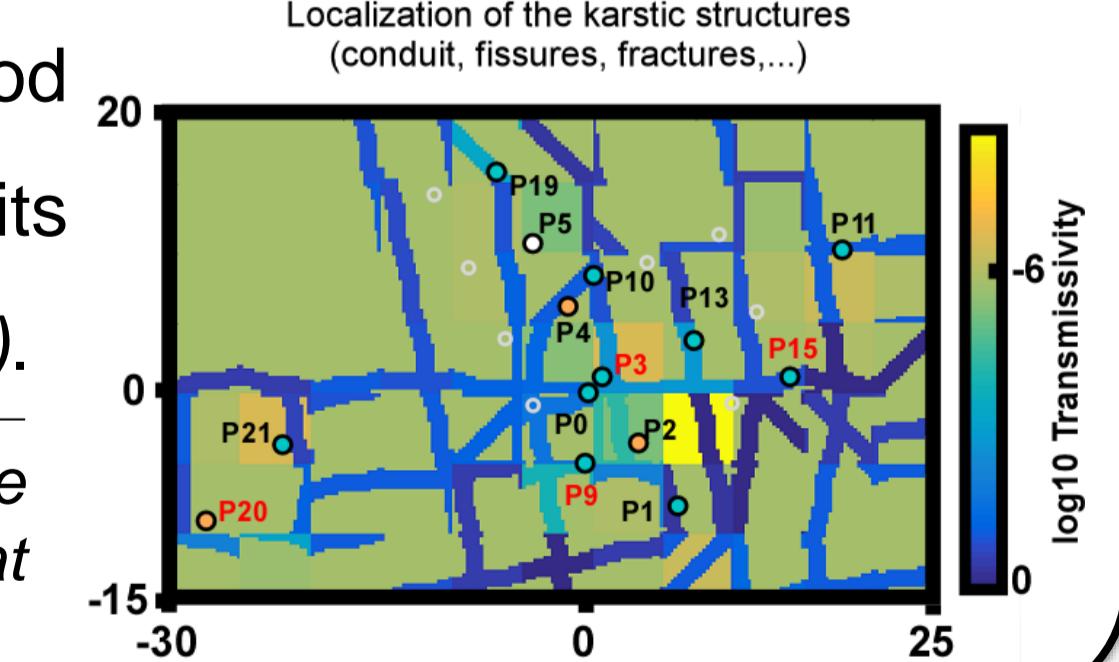
A degree of connectivity of each borehole toward the karstic network can be easily interpreted from these property maps (fig. 7).

### Impact of the period of signal on the responses

An analysis of the different maps of properties, uncertainties and of the differences between the results of the separate and joint inversions indicates that responses to a lower period hold a better information on the connectivity to the most conductive structures, while a higher period permits to better map the flows mobilized in conduits but also in less conductive karstic structures (fig. 8).

HIGHER FREQUENCY INFORMATION :  
Borehole connectivity to the main conduits network  
● In or close to (< 50 cm) the conduits network  
○ 1 or 2 m away from the conduits network  
○ More than 2 m away from the conduits network

LOWER FREQUENCY INFORMATION :  
Localization of the karstic structures (conduit, fissures, fractures...)
