Food processing

- Two processes are of interest for our research group:
 - > Transformation of the product through heat
 - > The composition of raw material can impact the concentration of by-products
 - > The duration and temperature of heat treatment can impact the nature of by-products
 - > Transformation of the product through formulation
 - The matrix plays a role in the bioavailability of the active molecules

Part 1: Nutritional and organoleptic impact of cooking

Effect of added nitrogen fertilizer on pyrazines of roasted chicory

- The addition of 120 kg ha⁻¹ of nitrogen fertilizer in the field resulted in a greater amount of pyrazines in the roasted chicory.
- The chicory odor was modified in two out of five varieties.

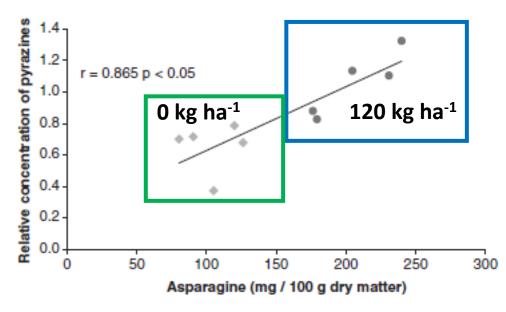


Figure 1. Relationship between free asparagine content and the relative concentration of pyrazines in roasted chicory from five commercial varieties grown under $0 \text{ kg ha}^{-1}(\P)$ and $120 \text{ kg ha}^{-1}(\P)$ of added nitrogen in 2011. The plot shows Pearson's correlation with the r- and P-values.

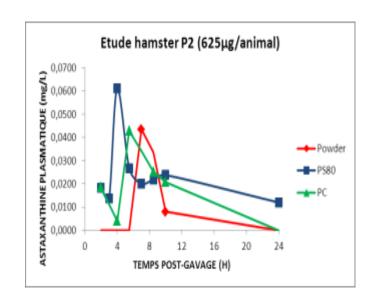






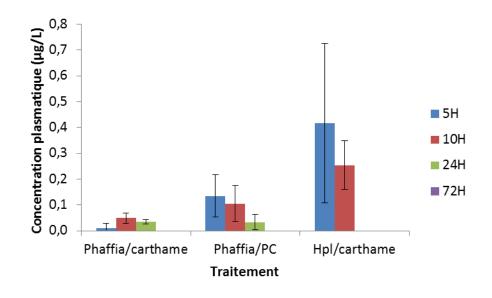


Bioavailability of two sources of astaxanthin; preclinical data



Hamsters study, AX fed in capsules

- Matrix effet
 - > Powder delays absorption in plasma
 - > Lipids do not have same AUC



Rat study, AX fed by gavage

- > Structure effect
 - > P. rhodozyma less absorbed than H. pluvialis
 - Lipids do not have same AUC

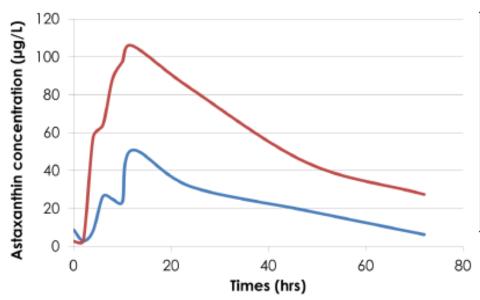

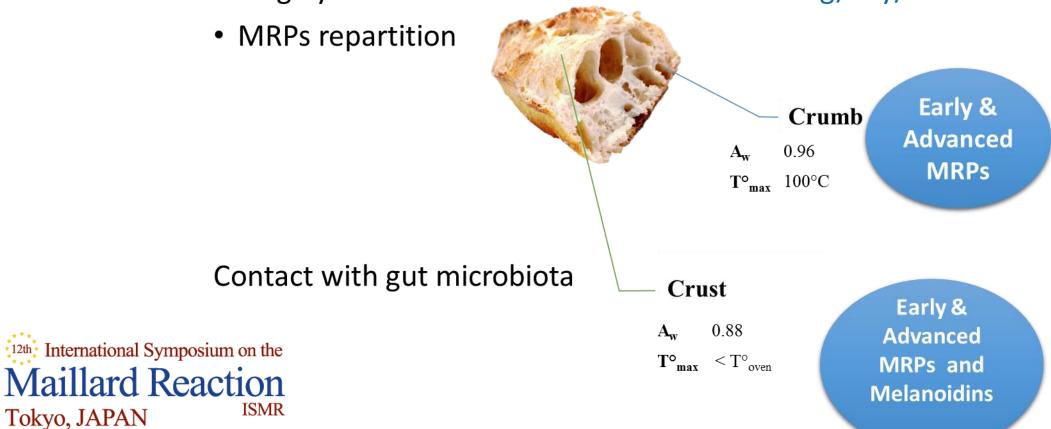

- > Role of extraction and formulation processes

- Source of carbohydates, vitamins, minerals and fibers
- Largely consumed food item with almost 160g/day/habitant



- some advanced glycation end-products (AGEs, e.g. melanoidins) have shown prebiotic activity.
- early AGEs seem to have ambiguous impact on colic inflammation
- different fractions of heat-treated food have shown cancer-promoting properties.

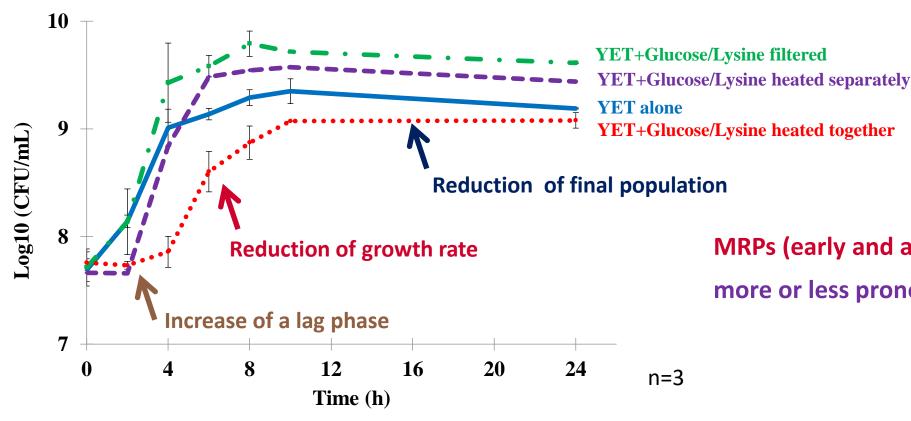

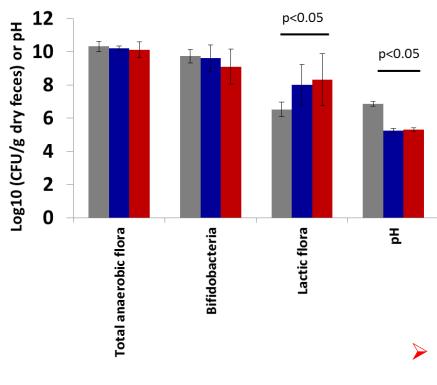
MRPs (early and advanced) → -ve impact /strains more or less pronounced depending on the strain

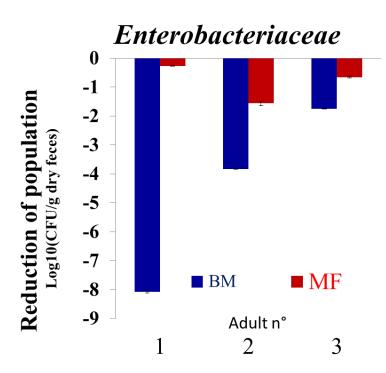

- > Stability of total anaerobic flora (no stress during fermentation)
- ➤ No change on « potential benefic bacteria » such as Bifidobacteria
- Increase of Lactic acid Bacteria associated with decrease of pH



- A decrease of enterobacteria in the two tested conditions was observed whatever the subject
- ➤ A higher reduction of Enterobacteriaceae in presence of bread melanoidins (BM) 13

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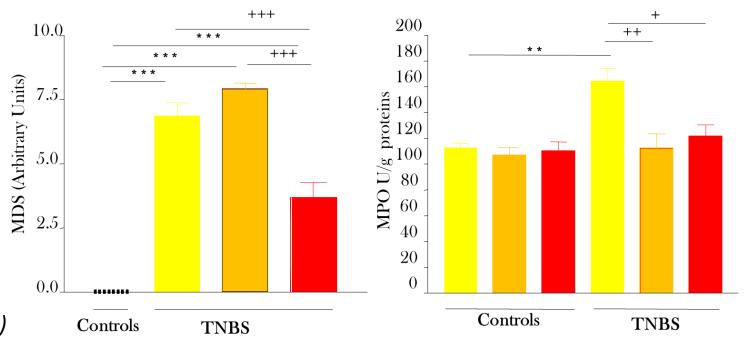

- Inflammation reduced in HH diet
- Pro-inflammatory marker (MPO) reduced with both MH and HH diets

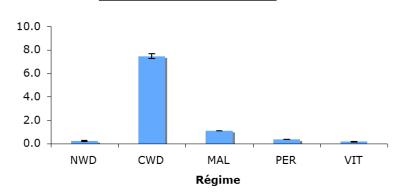
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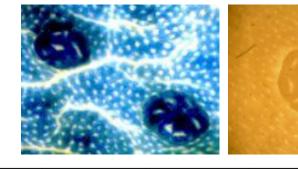

- No increase in spontaneous ACF formation with cooking
- But data suggest generalised dysplasia over the whole surface of colon
- > Associated with increased oxidative stress

Conclusions

 The different experiments have shown the importance of understanding not only the theoretical aspects of the individual bioactive compounds but also the role of the global matrix and food processing on the food composition, with the formation of new molecules and disappearance of some nutrients, and their consequences for the consumer.

- inflammatory effect of MRPs such as CML.
- prebiotic and antioxidant effects of dietary melanoidins.
